<p>In the speaking section, Band 103 implies that the candidate:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">● Is able to use Present Simple tense with some structure complications.● Generally understands the basic word order in the sentences.● Easily uses different kinds of verbs, pronouns and some simple prepositions but prepositions are mostly incorrect.● Is opened for English communication trying to speak fluently.● Usually maintains the flow of speech using repetition and self-correction.● Uses some connectives and discourse markers appropriately.● Produces simple speech fluently, but more complex communication causes fluency and coherence problems.		
		

International English Language Testing System (IELTS) was used to evaluate the student’s speaking skills. The speaking task evaluation involves five criteria: task achievement, fluency and coherence, lexical resource, pronunciation, grammatical range, and accuracy.
